Headmaster's Assembly

As the leaves start to fall and the mornings get a littler darker, I explained to the boys that this had made me think about the nature of change and how we approach it. I reminisced about my own schooling and a particular memory I have about a maths test that I was made to do upon returning from an illness. Having missed school when the material for the test was being taught, I got 60% right. Instead of focusing on the positive, my rather stern teacher focused on the 40% that I had got wrong. Thankfully, we have a change in our approach to teaching and learning now, focusing much more on the positives as opposed to over dwelling on the negatives. Today, there is great change all around us, especially in politics, and who knows what the outcomes will be? What is clear, for us and for the boys, is that change is a constant theme. Change, in the lives of our boys, might be moving houses, changing schools, losing a beloved pet, starting a new activity – changes that can be both positive and challenging. However, my message to the boys was clear. No matter how much we try, change of some sort is inevitable. More crucial is how we deal with it. We need to do our best to embrace the new experiences that change brings as change can help us grow, it reveals our strength of character, helps us with our own personal development and can offer us new possibilities.

Class Assembly: 'We don't grow when things are easy: we grow when we face challenges.'

On Wednesday, 6CR gave a fascinating Assembly on challenges. Mrs Richards reports: 'I have not failed, I have just found 10,000 ways that won't work'. This famous quote by Thomas Edison began the Assembly, asking what would have happened if Edison had given up after his first attempt. As a group we looked at why setting yourself challenges are important and shared some challenges that those in the tutor group have had to face; these included jumping into water from a height, abseiling and the daily challenge of getting up in the morning! We also looked at certain challenges faced in the world such as those faced by sports people and the global challenge of helping the environment by stopping using plastic. We asked the rest of the school to think of a daily challenge that they could do and make a positive influence on somebody else. **Toby Craig**, a member of 6CR, said, 'Everyone took part and all the boys had valuable information on how to overcome challenges, making it a very current and stimulating Assembly.'

PSHE Report by Mrs McKeown, Head of SMSC & PSHE, DSL

Our theme for PSHE this week has been Health and Wellbeing with topics relating to Keeping Safe and Growing and Changing. Recognising there is advice and guidance to help keep people safe in different places and situations, as well as being able to identify some of the risks that may occur in and out of school, has been a key part of discussions for Year 3. Year 4, 5 & 6 have explored change and transition. They have looked to describe ways to express feelings at times of change, recognising the importance of treasuring and sharing memories and where to seek advice and support if needed. Year 7 & 8 have focused on keeping safe in a wide variety of situations and considered the potential outcomes of the misuse of personal information and what to do and who to speak to if they receive images or communication online that makes them worried or upset. Next week Year 3 & 4 will study people who keep us safe at school and in the wider community and Year 5, 6, 7 & 8 will be exploring healthy relationships.

Tutor Sessions Report by Mr Eaves, Head of Pastoral Care

This week during Tutor sessions, the boys had the chance to vote for the members of the School Council (Year 3 vote after half term). This links into the discussions (last week) in PSHE on democracy, which is one of our Fundamental British Values. The new School Council will be announced by Mr Doble next week. Harvest Festival

We were thrilled to see so many families in attendance at the Harvest Festival in St Andrew's Church in Surbiton this morning. The boys rose beautifully to the occasion with all four choirs singing in the service. The junior choir performed a beautiful round called 'Autumn', while the Middle Choir added some spice to the service with the 'Harvest Samba'. The Senior Voices gave a moving rendition of Louis Armstrong's 'What a Wonderful World' and the SHS Singers gave a professional display of the music of John Rutter with 'Give me Wings' and the appropriate 'All things Bright and Beautiful'. Accompanied by Mr Stevenson on the piano and organ, Mr Thomas commented on the high level of choral singing at the service across the school, with the hymns being sung with gusto and energy by all.

Mrs Macallister in her address spoke about the very essence of Harvest. She said that Harvest is about preparing, gratitude and abundance; celebrations the world over, are about expressing thanks for the fruit of the land. She said that as we think of those less fortunate than ourselves, and the wonderful food donated and distributed, it is also key to think about the importance of preparing and growing, sowing seeds and harvesting - literally, in agriculture, spiritually, and in hearts and minds. It is as vital to work on our 'to be list' as our 'to do list' and prepare the ground well. History Talk Report by Mr Smart

On Wednesday evening, we were delighted to host a History talk entitled 'Airborne Chaplains of the Second World War' which was given by historian and writer Linda Parker. This is clearly a very specialist area and came about because one Shrewsbury House Old boy, who graduated from here around 1924, was actually an Airborne Chaplain, attached to the 6th Airborne Division during this conflict. His name was Captain The Rev Walter T Ogilvy, fondly known by his peers as "Watto" or "Tully", he left here for Harrow, then went up to Oxford. Later he was ordained and when war began in 1939 he joined the Army Chaplains Department serving in Ireland and then North Africa where he was captured with the tank unit he was attached to. He was sent to an Italian POW camp, got quite ill and was repatriated to the UK where he recovered his health and retrained as an Airborne Chaplain. The one obvious thing about Airborne units is that everyone has to be trained to parachute so they can be moved together and they all have to be very fit and Ogilvy clearly managed both. He was dropped in to Normandy during D Day in June 1944, served in the Ardennes during the Battle of the Bulge in December 1944 and was dropped

again during the Crossing of the Rhine operation in March 1945 where sadly, despite being a noncombatant Chaplain attached to a Medical unit, he was killed by a German Sniper aged 33 years.

My previous research uncovered some of the above, but after getting in touch with Linda she very generously and selflessly shared all her research, photos and some links to our old boy and he does feature in her future book – *Nearer My God to Thee*: *Airborne Chaplains of the Second World War*. The book is published by Helion later this autumn.

Linda gave a very interesting and, in many places, quite moving talk about this very specialist group of Chaplains and their experiences in the war. Clearly she was very passionate and interested in this topic and enjoyed talking about it. At the end the large number of SHS boys present asked a series of technical questions about airborne troops and gliders and she handled every query as seriously as the next. At the end she said she was very impressed by the boys and their questions.

I need to thank all the boys who attended with all their amazing questions, all the parents who came along, the old boys and parents of old boys, the local residents and neighbours who attended, the Local History Association, the Regency Bookshop in Surbiton for their help and support, the visitors from the Royal Star and Garter Home and to a huge team of staff here at SHS who made this possible.

Switch and Save

Year 5 Problem Based Learning (PBL) has seen boys produce 'Switch and Save' cards to go next to light switches across the school over the past two weeks. This ties in with Eco projects, with the School's development plan under 'switch and save culture' (premises and accommodation at schools), with sustainability and also focuses on a real world problem.
